<u>Think on These Things</u>

Are you ready for the Word!

"He who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and he who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. So let each one give as he purposes in his heart, not grudgingly or of necessity; for God loves a cheerful giver." 2 Corinthians 9:6-7

Throughout the Scriptures

we see passages encouraging us to give to those who are less fortunate, and to bless those who are in need. In fact, we are told, "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35b). I like to call this "thanks-giving," that is, giving generously to others as an expression of gratitude to God for His provision in our lives.

Paul the Apostle addresses this matter of giving in the main text above. Based on this passage I have identified two realities about giving that would be beneficial for us to understand. They are measurement and manner. The first reality, measurement, is an undeniable law of life – i.e. the law of sowing and reaping. As a young boy I recall my grandmother and mother telling me, you reap what you sow. I knew this phrase from my childhood. It was a remark usually made when I did something that was not very nice. It was used to warn me to be careful how I treat others, and how I think or talk about others. I was reminded that I was planting something that would be reaped later.

We will do well if we allow this principle to coach us through life. Galatians 6:7-10a states, "...whatever a man sows, that he will also reap...let us not grow weary while doing good, for in due season we shall reap if we do not lose heart. Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all." When I discovered that this principle, which my mother and grandmother instilled in me, was from the Bible and is a law that God Himself established for humanity, I realized how important it was for me to get this right.

Sowing and reaping is not a choice. It is not something that we choose to activate. It is always at work. We are always sowing something, whether we realize it or not. In our main text we see this principle at work and being applied to the area of giving. If we give scantily or stingily, then we have set the measurement standard of how we will reap in that area. If we give generously and even sacrificially then this measurement will be reflected in the time of reaping. This is obviously a measurement of volume and amount. Someone may be thinking; how could anyone have the audacity to tell people what they should do with the money they have earned?

The truth is we are constantly being told what we should do with our money. That is what advertising is all about. That is what branding is all about. Businesses consistently bombard us with information aimed at convincing us to buy their products – from cereal to electronics. As a result, consumers spend billions annually on products and "services" they may not really need.

Our main text offers us a perspective on the use of our financial resources that promises a better "product" than just spending money to get more stuff. It promises that when we give generously to others, rather than only spending on ourselves, we are operating at the best level of the sowing and reaping principle. And the return will be at least just as generous. Jesus also taught this principle of sowing and reaping in Luke 6:38, "Give, and it will be given to you: good measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over will be put into your bosom. For with the same measure that you use, it will be measured back to you." The more you give, the more God will cause you to become a channel of blessings.

The second reality is manner. This addresses "how" you give, and not the amount you give. We are instructed not to give grudgingly nor of necessity. In other words, don't give with the wrong motive or attitude, because it will sabotage the results, and nullify your reaping potential. To give grudgingly is to give unwillingly, which fosters resentment in your heart. This dismal condition of heart is rebuked by Paul's conclusive statement, "God loves a cheerful giver." Now, certainly God loves the world – and all peoples therein. I don't think Paul is saying that God only loves those who give cheerfully; however, he is communicating essential information about how God thinks about us. I am sure you can relate. Are there people whose ways you really like? You have observed how they act and react to people and life's circumstances, and you are impressed by their approach and disposition. Well, God makes the same observations in us; and He loves to see the heart that gives, and does it cheerfully.

There is a key question that the keen reader should ask about this text. That is, who monitors this law of sowing and reaping? The law is not conscious. It pertains primarily to the heart, motives, and manner of giving and not just to the math of giving. How is it working? Who is gathering this information on us? God is. He is the only one who can gather this kind of data and administer the appropriate seasons and measurements of reaping. God takes it that seriously. The evidence is clear, God loves generosity; and He loves to increase the generous.

Are you ready to sow generously? Are you ready to give of your surplus or to give sacrificially? Then go ahead and take the plunge; and do it cheerfully. You will be blessed in due season. This is what I call thanks-giving and thanks-living. Until next time, live thankful my friends, and think on these things.

I was positioned at the apex of the semicircle facing the window to the outside yard. At the end of the grace I said Amen, raised my head and open my eyes and there she was. Wynnie was standing outside the window looking in. She was gorgeous: skin like that of a baby, a

full head of black curly hair flowing down to her shoulders and wearing a lily-white dress made of lace. My heart stopped momentarily then began racing. What do I do now? I asked myself. Do I break eye contact and run outside to see if she'll be there, or just stand and stare? I'm going to take my chances, I thought, and run outside to meet her. So that's what I did. As I rounded the corner in the backyard, there she was radiant as ever in a white lace form fitting dress. She said nothing, verbally, but her eyes, those eyes were so welcoming. I reached for her. But, I couldn't touch her. She was

always out of reach. She kept moving every time I reached for her. I couldn't understand why. This dance went on and on until she was across Atlantic Ave near to my grand-daughter's school and I was on the other side. A Call to Higher Heights and Deeper Depths







"Any man being in Christ becomes a new creature, old things are passed away and behold all things becomes new," this is the experience of the new birth. 2 Corinthian 5:17

Having been exposed to church life from birth and hearing the proclamation of the Word through various mediums should in effect reflect a change at some stages of life.

Hearing the word does not guarantee a secured V. I. P. pass to life eternal. The Word of God is quite explicit in declaring that we must not only be hearers of the Word, but doers. To be doers we must study the Word, so that we can expound truth and be a living testament of the life and teaching of Christ. Individuals learn at a different pace, but the whole idea is, we are not expected to remain at a baby stage or stagnant, but the more we study the Word your life will bear fruit as you press towards the mark of the higher calling. However, the more we study the Word, internal and external challenges will arise, not only as individuals, but as a collective group, called the church.

There are many challenges the church will see, however, one challenge that the church is now facing is the yearning for a revival. As a church, we sadly want to dictate the terms and conditions for this to happen and only God is in control. This is in the Word, the Word we neglect and at times utilize as a last minute resort for resolution and other times, something we just ignore.

If we truly studied the Word of God, we would understand the things that are not in our control, are in God's control. That He is moving and shaping our lives to meet His plans not for us, but for the sake of His plans. Studying the Word, we will understand that God moves in mysterious ways at times. Sometimes He moves in the still, small voice, other times a mighty gushing wind. However, we must prepare ourselves to know His voice when He speaks, feel his presence when He moves and overall, be obedient to His voice. When we are prepared to truly seek, pause, and hear God's words to us, we will then be able to accelerate to higher heights and move beyond deeper depths.

The movement God has in store for us goes beyond just hearing and studying the Word, we must also give thanks. Giving thanks to God, praising Him for the highs and the lows, will allow us to achieve the higher level that God has planned for us. When we look at worship, we need to acknowledge that over time, the act of worship has changed significantly, from blessed quietness to a more participatory form of worship. However one decides to worship, the tone, body and movement, worship should be done with the entire being. A sense of gladness, giving praise and be receptive to let the Holy Spirit take control- take control to move you and elevate you to higher heights.

The existence of the church is not dependent on a manmade plan, but the majestic work of the Holy Spirit. There is a desperate call for the church to move to higher heights and deeper depths. Christ is calling the church to come up higher to be hearers of His leading and direction. This experience is not just mere emotions or a feel good moment, but to be in His presence is an experience that we are so longing for as the apostle did on the day of Pentecost. This state can only be accomplished when the body is in one accord and ready to receive the shift in the atmosphere.

As found in the book of Deuteronomy 29 verse 29 "the secret things belong unto the Lord our God but those things that are revealed belong unto us and to our children forever, that we may do all the words of the law." It is important that we understand that whatsoever is revealed to us through prophecy is to strengthen our relationship with God- to move us closer to Him, to be in sync with Him, to move in harmony with Him.

God has equipped the church with teachers, preachers, evangelist andprophets for the building up of the saints, to break strongholds and to enable us to fight and discern spiritual warfare. How can we do our roles as the body of the church, if we don't know what role is ordained for us. How can we truly be equipped, if we are unaware of our spiritual trajectory, because we cannot discern the voice of God? Christ ascending into the heavens was more than just Him going back home, it was and is a sign that God is taking us places- only if we obey and listen.

The danger of having a mere form of Godliness but no power allows to be swayed by every wind of Doctrine. We can easily hear the Word and in a twinkling of an eye, it can evaporate and we then lean on our own understanding. We are then consumed in our own self-righteousness and there is no room for the Holy Spirit to take residence in our lives.

It is our duty to let the Word of God dwell richly in our lives that when we enter in His presence the atmosphere will be so electrified with His glory that men will stand in amazement and wonder as we all are elevated to higher heights and breaking barriers within the deepest depths.

Mental Health First Aid

On Saturday, November 23, 2019 a joint group of leaders from Wake Eden Community Baptist Church and Bronx Baptist Church assembled in BBC's Fellowship Hall for a training on Mental Health First Aid.

The training was sponsored by ThriveNYC a program initiated by the First Lady of New York City, Mrs. Chirlane McCray, to assist persons experiencing mental health disorders. Our facilitator for the day was Ms. Egeria, who presented the program to us on behalf of the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene.

Ms. Egeria defined Mental Health as, "a state of well-being in which the individual realizes his or her own abilities, can cope with the normal stresses of life, can work productively and fruitfully, and is able to make a contribution to his or her community." On the other hand, she said that mental health illness is a condition that gets in the way of a person's thinking, relating to others, and carrying out normal day-to-day functions. She also said that Mental Health experts rate mental health disorders as among the most disabling of illnesses.

During the training we were told that everyone feels worried, anxious, and/or down from time to time. However, relatively few people develop a mental health disorder. Data has shown that one in five adults will experience a mental health crisis in a given year. These crises include: anxiety, depression, substance abuse, bipolar, eating disorder, schizophrenia and dementia.

Workshop participants were given useful tools to help deal with persons whom they came in contact with who may be experiencing some form of mental health disorder. Examples of tools include: Being a good listener. Do not interrupt when the person is speaking. Choose the right time and place to speak with the person. Stick to the facts and avoid exaggeration. In addition to the tools, participants were also provided with information about available programs for anyone who needed help. Programs were also targeted for those particularly at risk. Early intervention programs were designed for people with a mental health disorder. It is during this early intervention phase that Mental Health First Aid can play an important role.

She helped to dispel some of the myths associated with Mental Health. Some of these myths include:

- People with Mental Health Disorder are usually violent.
- People with Mental Health cannot hold down a job as they cannot deal with the stresses that comes with a job.
- There is no hope for people with Mental Health Illness.

Ms. Egeria encouraged us to employ some of the tools to better cope with someone experiencing a crisis.

Overall this was a necessary and important training. We learned that Mental Health illness is an equal opportunity issue. It affects young and old, male and female, and individuals of every race, ethnic background, education level, and income level. The good news is that with the right treatment the affected person can lead a healthy lifestyle.

The Desperate yet Determined Woman

In a sermon preached by Reverend Frank Williams recently, he referenced his message from 1 Samuel 1: 1-8 in which he titled, *"Hearing Hannahs"*

In the message from 1 Samuel, Elkanah, a man from Ramah, had two wives, Hannah and Peninnah. Peninnah had children but Hannah was unable to conceive, which caused her great sadness. Elkanah showed preferential treatment toward Hannah and so treated her with greater

compassion. However, with all the affection he devoted to her, she remained sad, feeling empty and discouraged because of her inability to conceive a child. Instead of being sympathetic towards Hannah's plight, Peninnah took advantage of the situation and made it her mission to make Hannah's life miserable. As stated by Reverend Williams, polyamorous relationships can be complicated.

Elkanah inadvertently created and facilitated a very difficult situation for the women in his life. One could bear children which would reap his inheritance and carry on his legacy, while the other whom he cherished, the love of his life, was unable to have any children. This was the perfect recipe for a prolonged emotional 'storm' in Hannah's life. The last thing we need when we are in pain is to have someone gloat about their success or to rub 'salt' in our emotional wounds. This was Hannah's experience.

Hannah needed to have a child. She desperately wanted to be a mother and even though the odds were stacked against her, Hannah never gave up. Instead she prayed relentlessly to God. She cried out to God in her desperation for Him to enable her to have a child. If God would only help her to conceive, she promised she would give the child back to Him. But to no avail. Still in her desperation and determination, Hannah wept and prayed.

"Hannah, why do you weep", her husband Elkanah asked who seemed perplexed about the unhappy demeanor of his wife. He went on to engage her: "And why won't you eat? Why is your heart sad? Am I not more to you than ten sons?" Elkanah's questions, though well-meaning seem to be out of touch with the deep cultural dilemma. And though she doesn't say so, he isn't the cause of her deep sadness. It's a different kind of love a woman has for her husband than she has for her children, and one can never completely replace the other. A woman's love is compartmentalized in her brain.

Out of the context of profound pain, Hannah had to live with endless antagonism in the same space as her rival, Peninnah. Even though she suffered emotionally, Hannah did not fight back. She did not run away. She simply did not give up. Though desperate she was determined and continued praying earnestly to God.

Hannah relied on her faith and even though the odds seemed to be against her, and despite her pain, and being mistaken as being drunk while praying quietly by Eli the priest, Hannah never stopped calling out to God. Eventually Hannah was released from her pain. God released her from her infertility, and she conceived and gave birth to a son whom she called Samuel.

In the end we see that Hannah's determination paid off. She never gave up and God ultimately exalted and vindicated her.

Can we take a page from Hannah's book and pray relentlessly to God so He can release us from our pain or are we so eager for a quick fix that we resort to self help?

- God can use adversity to build certain qualities deep within one's character that could not be fully developed in any other way.

- The danger is in believing that human reasoning can build the kingdom of God. It cannot.
- The world functions by vision; God's people live by revelation.
- The problem with many organizations is that they ask their people to make great sacrifices on behalf of puny visions.











Women's Prayer Breakfast

The weather was unsettling, the morning was damp and dreary but that was no deterrent to the almost 100 women from Honeywell Baptist, Bronx Baptist and Wake Eden Community Baptist Churches. These women and some men assembled in the church's fellowship hall on Saturday, December 14, 2019 to pray and commune with each other. The event was a joint sponsorship by Honeywell and Bronx Baptist churches and the focus was centered around the theme, "Broken for Anointing."

The day started with a choice of prayer stations where parishioners prayed for the many situations listed. This was followed by welcome and praise and worship.

The highlight of the Prayer Breakfast was the message given by the main speaker, Pastor Anita Ansah from New Jersey. Her message was on, "The Lady with the Alabaster Box." She pointed out that in the case of the Alabaster Box, in the Jewish tradition the lady comes out with the Alabaster Box with expensive perfumes and oils. Once she breaks the box it means she has accepted the man's offer to marry him. In the case Mary Magdalene, she was very close to Jesus Christ and she gave him her all. She broke her Alabaster and used the perfume to anoint the feet of Jesus and then used her hair to wipe it. All she had was her Alabaster Box. She also

noted that sometimes the process of breaking the box was necessary as without breaking there is no acceptance or anointing.

She urged us to live a life of sacrifice. She said that even though, not everyone has an Alabaster Box with expensive perfume,

but sometimes all we have is our lives and that can be our Alabaster where we give of ourselves to Jesus Christ.

We should live a life of conviction and not a life of convenience. She also highlighted the following points:

- 1. Without intimacy there can never be an outpouring. Out of the abundance of the heart there is action. We cannot entice God with our words without action.
- Without sacrifice, there is no anointing. Real brokenness comes at a place of prayer. Jesus needed a different level of anointing.
- 3. Is anyone among you sick?^{*} He should summon the presbyters of the church, and they should pray over him and anoint [him] with oil in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.
- 4. Christ is your only option. When we pray we must believe and not doubt, because the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind. That person is double-minded in all they do. James 1: 6-8



She urged us not to be afraid to break out of our Alabaster Box as when we live a sacrificial life then people should know. She also reiterated that we should live a life of conviction and not a life of convenience.

Whether it be board games such as Trouble[®] and Monopoly[®], or DIY games like charades and pictionary, family game nights are not only a way to unite the whole family, but build skills such as critical thinking, deductive reasoning, and vocabulary. In addition to the development of these academic skills, social skills are also enhanced as communication and good sportsmanship are practiced.

8. Set Goals

Goal setting presents the perfect opportunity to discuss areas of improvement. While this activity may not be appropriate for younger kids, children can benefit form this experience as early as seven years of age. Goal setting increases resolve and fosters willpower.

9. Dance

Dance has not only physical benefits such as increased flexibility, range of motion, strength and stamina, but also helps improve cognitive functions such as memory and attentiveness. Children express creativity and learn about their bodies through dance. Furthermore, the use of different genres and types of dance can help develop cultural awareness. Most importantly, it is fun.

10. Read Every Day

One of the most important ways to extend learning is to read every day. Reading boosts intelligence, increases empathy and reduces stress. Reading is also a way for adults and children to bond when the experience is shared.
